Pressure Tactics

We've begun our tour of deputies to help them understand the realities on the ground for foster families. Alongside these visits, we continue to make our voice heard... your voice. A TV advert is airing on the LCN and QUB news channels to reach a large number of Quebecers.



Negotiations

Despite all its efforts (37 meetings to date), your negotiating committee is still coming up against a lack of serious signals about the CPNSSS's willingness to agree with the FTRs' position on normative priorities. The FFARIQ has therefore submitted a request to the Ministry of Labour for the appointment of a mediator.

ARR: Court of Appeal Ruling

On February 25, the Court of Appeal overturned the Superior Court's decision on the unconstitutionality of the ARR with regard to the right of association and negotiation. In short, what this means is that, if mediation fails, arbitration will be optional. So, the CPNSSS will be able to decide and impose the terms of the collective agreement.

Decoded laws and negociations

Mediation and Arbitration: A Binding Negotiation Process for Resources

The Act respecting the representation of family-type resources and certain intermediate resources (ARR) establishes a specific framework for the negotiation of collective agreements regarding foster families. The various representative associations can negotiate with the Ministère de la Santé et des Services sociaux, but their bargaining power remains limited by a strict legal framework, particularly with regard to mediation and arbitration.

In the event of an impasse, a party may request the appointment of a mediator by the Minister of Labour. Mediation is compulsory, and the parties must actively participate. The mediator has 60 days to try to reconcile positions, with a possible extension of 30 days. If no agreement is reached, a report is published, exerting public pressure on the parties.


However, if mediation fails, arbitration is optional. Both parties must agree to it and define its limits. Legal limitations on negotiable subjects, particularly concerning the organization of services and the financial aspects of collective agreements, favour the government. This raises the question of the government's interest in accepting arbitration in the event of an impasse on negotiable matters.

What's more, pressure tactics are severely restricted. Any action that compromises services to users is prohibited, making a strike impossible. Even minor measures, such as altering meeting times, can be deemed illegal.

The FFARIQ is fully aware of the constraints imposed by the ARR and the imbalance it creates in the balance of power between the parties. While legislative changes are necessary to make negotiations more equitable, it must, in the current state of the law, deal with the limited tools at its disposal. That said, on February 27, FFARIQ asked the Minister of Labour to appoint a mediator. Regardless of the bargaining regime that governs the parties, the mediation process remains a service that may prove useful in the discussions, in order to move towards a satisfactory settlement for its members within the framework of the renewal of the collective agreement.

A Frantic Pace

"We were accredited at the end of May. On June 27, I received a proposal to welcome a newborn baby due on June 30. On the 30th, the child was born. I completed my day's work to finalize my departure and, on July 1st, we went to pick up Gabriel."

While dating, Patrick and Jimmy had discussed whether or not they wanted to have a child. With the pandemic and their advancing age, they made their decision. They researched their options, given the complexities of surrogacy. They turned to the mixed banks. After an information session, they embarked on this wonderful project.

Two Dads

Being a gay couple didn't pose any obstacles."At the initial meeting, there must have been 60 people. We were the only gay people there. We didn't feel left out. Not until the evaluation process. They asked us questions and we weren't accredited beforehand. They asked us to read a book to discuss the difference between an adopted child and a biological child. This led to a short pause of 2 or 3 months for reflection. After that, it wasn't a long process. We sent the documents in February 2021, before the evaluation process. The first evaluation meeting took place in June 2021. There was a break from February to April 2022 approximately, and then we were accredited following the final meeting in May 2022" says Patrick. They were now ready to welcome a child, ideally between the ages of 0 and 1, of any gender and preferably with no known severe disabilities. "But, as many issues are diagnosed only after the age of 3, we didn't expect the child to have none," adds Patrick.

The Great Adventure of Welcoming the 1st Child

The couple's first proposed child had no known father, and his mother had a mild intellectual disability and hearing problems. According to the couple's research, the mother's known disabilities are not necessarily hereditary. The couple agreed to welcome the child. They were told it would be a girl.

On June 30, surprise! It's a boy! Jimmy takes the day off and changes the colors of the room and the clothes. The couple is ready to welcome the newborn!

In the late morning of July 1st, Patrick and Jimmy went to the hospital to pick up Gabriel and meet his biological mother. "My first instinct was to bang on the wall of his incubator to see if he was deaf. We were aware that we might not have an instant connexion, but when we saw him, we thought "Wow! That's our baby!" A beautiful 8.6-pound baby. At the medical examination, everything was perfect."

The Importance of Being Well Surrounded

When Gabriel joined the family, Patrick had just changed jobs. Therefore, Jimmy took the parental leave. However, for the first month, they both took time off to adjust to their new life together. Visits to the birth mother and the youth center were numerous: 3 a week for the first 6 months, then 2 a week at the youth center. "It was very busy! Fortunately, our close family came to help us. My parents are very present. Once or twice a week, family and friends would come to see us and support us," says Patrick.

Visit to Birth Mother: Gabriel's Emotional Yo-yo

Between court deadlines, visits and the new routine of shortened sleep, the couple were able to devote their time to caring for Gabriel, thanks to the support of their loved ones. "After the visits, Gabriel needed a lot of attention. We couldn't put him down, he would cry. Naturally, he never slept much, but after the visits, he became more irritable," recalls Patrick. These visits were hard on Gabriel, as his biological mother couldn't console him, didn't know how to prepare the milk, and didn't provide the diaper bag. At the pediatrician's, the mother was present. She couldn't console Gabriel. During the one-year vaccinations, the caregiver let Patrick take Gabriel for his own well-being. He wanted his daddy's arms.

In April, it will be 6 months since Gabriel last saw his mother. "The visits weren't going well. So, since December 2023, I've been there. At first, Gabriel would cry. He would approach the door to get out of the room. We had to stay at least 15 minutes out of an hour-long visit. When we got home, he needed reassurance. He would hang on to us."







The mother threatens to stop seeing him, even if she asks for more frequent and longer visits. Her absence is a means of pressure to obtain these contacts. The biological mother's threats to stop visiting and her disengagement lead the youth center to reconsider the life project.

The Challenge of Daycare

Around 14 months old, Gabriel started daycare. For the first year, there were tantrums every morning. Sometimes Patrick or Jimmy had to go back and get him. Since last fall, things have been going well.

Gabriel's socialization is going really well. Sometimes he needs to be in his own corner. Otherwise, he goes to see the educator and his friends.

Sharing Roles

Although the couple are in sync on parenting values, Patrick and Jimmy have a different style for discipline. "I'm more affectionate. When Gabriel gets hurt, he comes to me. Jimmy is more authoritarian. The interventions are different, but we practice positive parenting and we don't shout at home. We give Gabriel the space he needs to learn from experience."

Gabriel is a playful, smiling child. He has a big attitude. He knows what he wants and can say it. Patrick says he's very endearing and wants to help. Even more so now that he has a little brother!

The Arrival of Guillaume

The couple's 2nd child, Guillaume, arrived when Gabriel was due for a visit. The biological mother didn't show up, so Patrick drove Gabriel back to the daycare center. At 11 a.m., the youth center offered to take in a 2-month-old boy, 13 months younger than Gabriel. At 3 p.m., Patrick went to pick up Gabriel from the day-care center and extra clothes from his parents' home. Then Guillaume came into their lives!

Gabriel had a short period of adjustment to this new arrival, which affected his mild attachment disorder. However, it didn't last long, and the role of big brother caregiver was quickly established. A well-established routine meant he wasn't too unsettled.

A Life-Changing Experience

What has the arrival of the children brought us? EVERYTHING! They didn't sleep here last night, because yesterday I had a dinner party with friends. It's hard to be away from them for more than 24 hours. We're told to take advantage of our freedom to do whatever we want, but at the same time, we can't see our lives without them. All we have to do is look at them, and we forget everything that can sometimes be difficult. I stopped training when we had Gabriel. But now that they're grown up, I can still train. The playroom is right next to the home gym. Yes, it's a bit of a step aside, but it's so much fun! And we're still open to having a 3rd child," concludes Patrick.

Tips from the Pros

Performance Anxiety in Children

Performance anxiety is an increasingly widespread phenomenon among young people, whether at school, in sport or in the arts activities. The sources of this anxiety are just as numerous as the effects it has on children. We demystify it for you.

What is Performance Anxiety?

Performance anxiety occurs when a young person is under intense pressure to succeed or achieve a certain level of excellence. It can occur occasionally, for example during assessment periods, or chronically. It is characterized as follows:

- Fear of failure;
- Recurring negative thoughts;
- Physical symptoms such as nausea, palpitations, dry mouth, cold sweats, sleep disorders.

The Sources

In an increasingly competitive world, there are many occasions to experience anxiety-creating pressure:

- Comparison with peers, particularly through exposure to social networks;
- Caring parents who, unaware of the impact of their expectations, can create a fear of failure;
- Demanding school environment;
- High expectations in sports or other disciplines.

The Effects

Performance anxiety can have significant impacts on emotional, social and academic life, such as:

- Low self-esteem;
- Feeling discouraged;
- Social isolation;
- Headaches;
- Digestive disorders;
- Lack of energy.

If not treated in time, this anxiety can lead to more serious disorders, such as depression or eating disorders.



What You Can Do About It

The role of parents, coaches and teachers is crucial in helping children with anxiety. First, by recognizing signs such as excessive fear of failure, unusual irritability and withdrawal from social activities. Communication is then important, creating a safe space where the child can express their concerns without fear of being judged or reprimanded. Here are a few tips:

- Value effort, perseverance and the pleasure of learning, rather than focusing on results and perfection. This helps us to understand that failure is part of the learning process and does not call into question its value.
- Reduce pressure. Expectations must be adapted to the young person's age and abilities. It's essential to create an environment where the child feels supported and not observed under a microscope.
- Promote stress management. Teaching techniques such as deep breathing or mindfulness and encouraging physical exercise can help young people better manage their emotions and reduce their anxiety levels.
- Seek professional support if necessary. If anxiety persists, or if it becomes too difficult to manage on your own, a professional can provide support.

The Institut universitaire Jeunes en difficulté (IUJD), in collaboration with the Équipe de recherche sur le placement et l'adoption en protection de la jeunesse (ERPAPJ), has recently published new clinical tools to support toddlers experiencing supervised visits or family reunification.

Accompanying toddlers in care requires explaining complex realities to them: why do they no longer live with their parents? What do supervised visits mean? Why do they have to leave their foster family? Finding the right words to approach these delicate subjects is a real challenge for adults.

Aware of this reality, IUJD and ERPAPJ researchers and caregivers have developed two clinical kits for children aged 4 to 8. Each kit includes:

- An illustrated album telling a child-friendly story;
- Activity sheets to encourage discussion;
- A guide for accompanying adults.

An experienced-based initiative


These kits were created in response to the concern of clinical teams who needed tools to address these complex realities with children. For example, one team found itself at a loss when two girls said they didn't want to return to their birth families after spending a year in foster care. Yet, for the adults involved, this reunification was good news!

"We looked for age-appropriate tools to explain and open up the discussion with them... and we couldn't find anything! That's when the idea of writing a children's story came naturally," reports Hélène Savard, Publishing Director and Head of the Montreal Implementation Department.

Thanks to the expertise of IUJD and ERPAPJ researchers, the story has been enriched with activity sheets and an accompanying guide. "We looked for studies that focused on the experience of young people in the context of family reunification and supervised visits, to ensure that the tools developed were in line with best practice. The tools were then created in close collaboration between researchers and practitioners," explains Marie-Pierre Joly, Publication Director and Project Manager at IUJD.

Bill 15 and its Impact

Since Bill 15 came into force in December, we've welcomed many new members. As a reminder, Bill 15, also known as Quebec Health Act, aims to centralize and restructure the healthcare network, which has led to changes in our union organization. Henceforth, only one union is authorized per region, which required considerable adaptation work. As a result, FFARIQ has integrated 850 additional families in Montreal and 34 new families in Laval.
