A Word from our President

Dear families,



The past year has been very busy. We had the opportunity to meet on several occasions: apple picking, sugar shack, Christmas party, symposium, regional tours. I am very happy about that! You are the heart and soul of the organization, and it is essential to talk to you to find out what concerns you. You are the pulse of our organization.

To that end, in January, we will need your help to determine how we can continue to better meet your needs. You will receive a survey that will allow you to tell us what is important to you and what your needs are. It will be mailed to families who have requested to receive communications by mail. For others, you will be able to fill it out online. Thank you for sharing your opinion with us. It is really important to us.

Let's take a look back together. The results for the year are impressive!

Agreement and New Region

First of all, we have completed negotiations. It was a real obstacle course! After more than 50 meetings with the Comité patronal de négociation de la santé et des services sociaux (CPNSSS), the FFARIQ requested the appointment of a mediator on March 31, 2025. FFARIQ members accepted the mediator's proposal, and we are now waiting for the new minister, Sonia Bélanger, to sign it.

On January 21, we welcomed foster families from the Montreal area, who joined the Batshaw region. We are very happy about this!

Public Relations and Media

On the political front, I met with several members of Parliament and ministers to share with them the field reality and the concrete impact that a broken system has on foster families and children. We also denounced inconceivable situations in the media to raise public awareness of your reality.



Advertisements were also broadcast with significant impact. We thank Minister Carmant for trying to do something in the turmoil of this system. He created the position of Child Welfare Commissioner. He implemented certain elements of the Laurent Commission report. However, there is still so much to be done! We hope that our voices will be heard even more.

International Influence

The actions and positions taken by the FFARIQ do not go unnoticed. In November, Chantal St-Pierre, Annie Blouin, and I welcomed a group of 15 Japanese visitors from the Shiseido Child Foundation. These professionals who work with children chose to meet with us after evaluating the reputation of various Canadian organizations. They wanted to learn about our services and the support we offer to foster families. We are proud that the work carried out over the past 51 years by our presidents and their teams has had such an impact. Our visitors appreciated our caring approach and our forward-thinking actions. This recognition of our relevance is a great way to end the year!

My Wishes for 2026

If laws and regulations were adapted to foster families, there would be fewer tragedies and fewer neglected children. We want equality for all types of foster families. We want all neglected children to be supported and foster families to receive adequate support to care for children who have experienced multiple traumas.

I wish you a very happy holiday season. Take this time to rest, spend time with your loved ones, and cook delicious meals with your family. Take good care of yourselves during this busy time.

On October 18 and 19, our symposium was held at the Delta Trois-Rivières. With the theme **Between Duty and the Heart**, this event was an opportunity to recharge, be inspired, and have fun.

Navigating Between Feelings and Obligations

From the outset, our president, Mélanie Gagnon, recognized the immense work done by foster families who, every day, must find a balance between their heartfelt vocation and the duties imposed on them by laws and regulations. A foster family opens its home and privacy to children who are suffering. It offers them warmth, comfort, and security. While mending broken hearts and frayed emotions, they ensure that they provide a place for development that is guided by the DYP framework.

More and More Children Need Us

Ms. Gagnon took the opportunity to highlight some figures from the 2024-2025 DYP Report. In one year, reports increased by 5%. This means that 6.3% of young Quebecers aged 0 to 17 were the subject of at least one report. That's huge! Of this number, 8,104 children were referred to family-type resources and proximity families. FFARIQ foster families opened their doors and hearts to 6,500 of these children. Without you, these children would not be able to live in a safe and loving family environment. You are invaluable!

A Wealth of Useful Tools!

The presentation by Marie-Pierre Joly, Ph.D. in Social Work, project manager at the Institut universitaire jeunes en difficulté, and Marie-Andrée Poirier, director of the School of Social Work and full professor, provided a wealth of tools to help our foster families in their daily lives.

Under the theme **Between foster family and biological** family: how to support the child, the speakers proposed a method for dealing with the challenges of the complex family environment in which foster children live. Between family

reunification, supervised visits, and foster care in general, there are many challenges for foster parents, children, and professionals.

Through bibliotherapy or reading stories to address complex or sensitive issues with children, it is possible to meet these challenges.

Stories and activities allow us to address complex topics that could reawaken trauma without triggering alarm bells," explained the speakers.

Two kits were presented at the conference:

- Albert retourne à la maison helps recognize the emotions associated with family reunification. Success, joy, sadness, grief for parents. Complex and ambiguous emotions for children who often leave without really being informed.
- En route vers ta visite opens the discussion on the conflicting emotions that children may experience during supervised visits: happiness at seeing their parent, fear, misunderstanding, conflict of loyalty, stress. It also allows foster parents to address the challenges and emotions that this raises, as well as the difficulty of understanding and supporting the sometimes intense reactions of children.

Practical Tips for Staying Strong

Under the theme *When the mission demands a lot: how to stay strong*, speaker David Bernier adapted his experience to the lives of foster families. Taking in children with heavy baggage can turn your personal, professional, and family life upside down.

Drawing on the research of Dr. Richard Wiseman, he helped us understand how our perceptions can distance us from our intentions. Among other things, he suggested a method for anchoring ourselves in the present, staying focused, and eliminating stress: the 3Rs.

Ralentir - Respirer - Relaxer (Slow down - Breathe - Relax)

Cardiac coherence is a concrete technique presented for the breathing component. It consists of inhaling for 5 seconds, holding your breath for 5 seconds, then exhaling for 5 seconds. Do this for 5 minutes a day, which is very little for at least 5 hours of well-being! The RespiRelax+ app helps you breathe better to manage stress more effectively, and it's free! Give it a try.





An Evening of Emotions and Fun

We were touched in the evening by listening to Victoria, a foster child with her parents Suzie Boyer and Laurent Thibodeau. She took to the stage to perform a song she wrote expressing what it's like for a child whose family opens their home and hearts to children who are just passing through. Santé Québec: A Challenge for Resource Representation

Since the creation of Santé Québec on December 1st, 2024, the health and social services network has been undergoing a significant period of adjustment. It is still too early to measure its concrete effects on foster families and the children entrusted to their care.

Notable Effects on FTRs

That said, for family-type resources (FTRs), the creation of Santé Québec has had notable effects on both associative representativeness and the collective bargaining process. The law provides that there be only one representative association per category of resources — for children or adults — in each health and social services region.

This new mechanism has led to significant inconsistencies between the representativeness of resources, the collective agreement applicable to them, and the professional monitoring of the children entrusted to them.

From now on, the representativeness of a resource depends on its health and social services region of residence, so that the applicable collective agreement becomes that of that region, even when the child in care belongs to another institution.

The institution responsible for the professional supervision of the child thus finds itself applying a collective agreement to the resource caring for the child that is different from the one to which it is normally bound.

To overcome this difficulty, several institutions have created additional local consultation committees so that they can apply different agreements depending on where these resources reside, sometimes up to four separate collective agreements, which has made management more cumbersome.

Approaches to the MSSS

These changes occurred in the midst of collective bargaining and the deployment of concerted pressure tactics, when the FFARIQ bargaining committee had already held more than 50 meetings. This administrative redefinition added further complexity to a framework already constrained by the Act respecting the representation of family-type resources and certain intermediate resources and the negotiation process for their group agreements (ARR).

True to its mission, the FFARIQ has twice raised the issue of the representativeness of resources by health and social services region with representatives of the Ministry of Health and Social Services (MSSS), in the hope that a solution can be found in the short term. Nevertheless, it remains vigilant and does not rule out, if necessary, bringing the issue before the appropriate authorities if the required adjustments are not made in a timely manner.


ARR: Political Representation

At the same time, it is continuing its political commitment to ensuring compliance with one of the recommendations of the Laurent Commission, which proposed evaluating the impact of the ARR on the reality of foster families and services to children—a reflection that the FFARIQ wishes to continue in favor of a more balanced negotiating framework and more stable services for children and resources.

These complementary measures aim to restore consistency to the representation framework and ensure a clearer, more stable, and fairer system for all resources and the children entrusted to them.

There is no doubt that life is very busy for this young woman who is bursting with energy, love, and plans!

"They are my children, they are my family."

Pamella-Marie Gill is 31 years old. She always dreamed of having a big family, living on a small farm, and having animals. Part of her dream has come true. As a single-parent foster family, Pamella-Marie has 7 children at home, aged between 6 months and 15 years: two biological children (an 8-year-old girl and a 6-month-old boy), three 4-year-old girls in temporary foster care until they turn 18, one child in proximity foster care (her 15-year-old nephew), and one adopted 2-year-old child.

There is no doubt that life is very busy for this young woman who is bursting with energy, love, and plans!

An Unusual Journey

I always wanted to have a big family. I have always been committed to protecting children. I had a daughter and was a single parent. I was ready to undergo solo insemination when, suddenly, I was asked to take in my nephew. I quickly agreed. And I thought to myself, if I'm doing this for my nephew, why not do it for other children?" says Pamella-Marie. That was in 2021. In 2022, she was officially accredited.

The single mother did not follow the same path as other foster families. She was evaluated by a psychologist before applying to become a foster parent. It must be said that her journey was slowly but surely guiding her toward this vocation. Pamella-Marie has a bachelor's degree in social work and is a member of the Order of Social Workers. She did an internship at the Montreal Youth Center and worked as a daycare educator. She also has a certificate in criminology and a college diploma in early childhood education.

The PFA to PF accreditation process took a year. Two weeks later, in August 2022, she was accredited as a FTR and welcomed her first child on October 3. A placement until majority.

Pamella-Marie and her little family moved from their $4\frac{1}{2}$ to a house she rented. There, she opened an accredited home

daycare. The family grew, and the mother benefited from a few exemptions because the number of rooms was limited. During the same period, she realized her dream of having animals and opening a cattery for breeding Tonkinese-Siamese cats. "The children love cats! They are part of our family life." In March 2025, she bought a house, and the family moved in on October 31, 2025. Finally, she closed the daycare center in September 2023, as the hours were not compatible with the various obligations related to the appointments and challenges of the children she cared for.

Ian: The Bright Child with a Dark Beginning

In 2023, Pamella-Marie received a call from the DYP. Although she was not an emergency foster family, she was asked to take in a three-day-old baby boy. She agreed, to help out. At one week old, she took him to the pediatric ward because of severe diarrhea. Ian made two more trips to the pediatric ward without the cause of the problem being found.

Over the weeks, Pamella-Marie noticed that lan was not using his arm much. During a routine medical appointment, she mentioned this to the doctor, who referred her to a pediatrician. The diagnosis was hypotonia, or weakness of the trunk and jaw muscles. Ian was underweight because he had difficulty feeding.

Very early on, professionals entered Ian and Pamella-Marie's lives: occupational therapists, nutritionists, and physical therapists. They were very present, coming twice a week to give tips on how to get Ian to drink, enrich his milk, feed him properly, and develop his muscles, mainly on his right side. "It was a real team effort. Then, over time, the pediatrician diagnosed fetal alcohol spectrum disorder, which was later confirmed by specialists at Sainte-Justine Hospital. The prognosis was very bleak," says Pamella-Marie.

Adopting Ian

Despite all the warnings from specialists about Ian's genetic baggage, his fetal alcoholism, and the possibility of mental and motor delays, Pamella-Marie was determined. She wanted to adopt Ian. "He's my son," she said.





An administrative issue also complicated the process: she was not registered as a mixed bank. Regardless, Pamella-Marie did not give up. After a few weeks, she was allowed to adopt lan. On July 16, he officially became her son and took the name Gill.

lan is now two years old. He started walking late, at around 19 months. He is beginning to talk. He is also starting to run, even if he falls a little, and the signs of fetal alcohol syndrome are visible on his face. But he is part of a loving family that spares no effort to help him. "He's super smart, funny, and very sociable. He's happy and has a great love for life. His main strength is his determination. He could have given up on his challenges, but when he falls, he gets back up. He's determined, endearing, and affectionate," Pamella-Marie proudly describes him.

Despite a difficult start in life, lan was lucky enough to cross paths with Pamella-Marie. She is a woman for whom having a family is as much a matter of the heart as it is of genetics.

The Many Highs and a Few Lows

"Being a foster family means being a family for life. There are ups and downs. Children have challenges. You always have to be innovative and creative to keep everyone happy and content. What I want to show the children is that, despite our difficulties, we are a family. No family is perfect, but I wouldn't go back for anything in the world!" says Pamella-Marie.

She calls the children she takes in her own children. For her, they are simply in shared custody with their biological parents. This is also the case for the extended family, particularly Pamella-Marie's mother, who comes to help the little family three times a week.

In addition to being well supported, Pamella-Marie is careful to protect her biological children. "I once had an emergency placement that lasted eight months. My daughter got along

very well with her. When she left, my daughter was very upset. So I asked to only have children in long-term placements. I don't want my daughter to suffer," she confides.

The role of a single-parent foster family is not always easy and can create tension between families. The responsibility is twofold: protecting the child while maintaining ties with our own family. This sometimes puts single-parent foster families in uncomfortable situations.

Recommendations for Those Who Want to Become Single Foster Parents

- You must not be afraid of commitment.
- Be very organized.
- Choose to devote your life to children. There are a lot of appointments, so you need to be flexible.
- Surround yourself with a good support network.
- No one is perfect. Give warmth, love, and quality time.

Bernita: the witch who gives children missions

Pamella-Marie creates a whole world by writing children's stories. Her main character, Bernita the magical witch, and her friend Mylos, a friendly skeleton, have all kinds of adventures as Christmas approaches. Flying broomsticks, a train that smells like Christmas candy and is soft enough to go anywhere, talking snow... As a bonus, she offers an inspiring creative activity at the end of each story for children ages 4 to 8!

Tips from the Pros



Financial Support for Young Children

The DYP Youth Foundation is delighted to partner with the FFARIQ to support its members who care for children aged 0 to 5. To this end, financial assistance has been available for several months now to directly support the needs of these young children.

The work, dedication, and commitment of foster parents to children is simply tremendous and is not sufficiently recognized. That is why the DYP Youth Foundation is sincerely happy to offer a helping hand to these families through the Leclerc-Racine Fund, project 0-5 years old.

These funds enable foster families to purchase the materials, equipment, and support that are essential to the situation of the child in their care and that are not covered by the government.

Examples of eligible expenses:

- Funding for equipment adapted to the specific needs of the child or for specialist consultations, provided that such equipment and professional services are not already covered by the government. Respite care for families could also be funded from this amount, if necessary.
- Purchase of 0-5 year old global development kits, including materials adapted to the child's needs and age. These kits will be used by practitioners and families to assess and ensure the child's cognitive, motor, language, neurological, and socio-emotional development by the family and intervention staff.
- Stimulation games, sensory objects, adapted equipment, specialized professional support, etc.

The FFARIQ has full responsibility for the funds made available to you. It is responsible for reviewing requests submitted to it in the various regions where it operates and responding to them in a spirit of fairness, efficiency, and transparency.

From April 2025 to June 2026, a maximum of \$100,000 will be made available to FFARIQ members. So don't hesitate to submit a request to your regional office. And hurry, because funds are running out fast!




